A story about love and resilience through grief. Paloma's words take you to unexpected places to articulate feelings you didn't even know existed.

Enough to Let the Light In is written by a Latina, directed by a Latina, starring Latinas, and led by a creative team of 80% women. Nothing would be more fitting than to dedicate this show to one of the anchors of our artistic community, Myrna Salazar, who passed away in August. Myrna is the founder of the Chicago Latino Theater Alliance and the Destinos Festival.

Her absence is felt not only by the Chicago Latine community, the impact of Myrna's work reaches far beyond.

Myrna was a pioneer, a mother, an advocate.

She wasn't just the pillar of our community, she built it. Crafted the Latine arts community from her own sense that we were all pure excellence and that all we needed was access. From Myrna we learned so much. Watching her speak truth to power was a gift and a lesson. She held the powers that be to account with such grace and fierce strength that no one could say no to Myrna,

it was nearly impossible. We've tried. Myrna was an advocate for Latine theater artists all over the world. She smashed glass ceilings with grace, she didn't ask for a seat at the table, she built those tables. By creating the Chicago Latino Theater Alliance, she created a space for Latine artists to thrive. Myrna's legacy has no choice but to continue on through us, she made sure of it.

Chicago's rich Latine theater history is often overlooked in the canon of American work. Myrna believed it is up to all of us to make sure our history is not erased.

It is because of her vision that Enough to Let the Light In exists in this space today, because of the table Myrna built.

Myrna, thank you for using every earthly power you could summon to make change for our community. Thank you for making every one of us feel seen. Thank you for never ever backing down and fighting to the very end for each and every one of us.

And thank you now, for being our ancestor, for continuing to blaze a path for us on the other side.

We'll leave the ghost light on for you, reina.

I ask myself, often, why I continue to pursue work in theatre. It is certainly not glamorous work, nor is it financially beneficial for most (let's be real). And it's ephemeral- if you miss that one production, if there's no extension, if there's no filmed version- it's just gone. Theatre can be tedious, political, frustrating. Thankless. So, why?

For me, it always comes back to this: there is nothing more thrilling than having a collective experience in a room full of strangers who are watching the story unfold as the actors unfold it, waiting with bated breath to find out what happens next. When the pregnant pause is so silent you could hear a pin drop. When a storypoint is revealed that makes you gasp, or want to hold your seat neighbor's hand. I love the irreplicable experience of theater, and it's one I've longed for desperately since the beginning of the pandemic (especially when it's one of those weird little plays that you see on a whim and have no idea what to expect. Those are my favorites).

I hope this is that experience for you, and I hope you love watching it as much as we loved making it.

Melissa DuPrey (Marc) is a multidisciplinary artist, producer, and playwright with roots from Humboldt Park, Chicago. She is a critically-acclaimed solo artist whose work spans over a decade with 5 full-length solo plays highlighting the intersections of Blackness, queerness, healing, and sexuality. DuPrey is also a community organizer and spiritualist who launched The Good Grief Project in 2020- an extension of the social justice component from her solo play GOOD GRIEF where communities of color are connected to local, accessible and

multidisciplinary mental and spiritual wellness practitioners of color. DuPrey's full-length play BRUJAJA, directed by Miranda Gonzalez, was digitized as a theatrical film by UrbanTheater Company in 2021 for its world premier. She has performed stand-up comedy in Chicago, New York, New Jersey, Philadelphia, and Los Angeles. She was most recently seen as "Dr. Sara Ortiz" on Greys Anatomy (Season 17 and 18). She's also been seen on Empire (FOX), The Resident (FOX), Chicago PD (NBC), and The Chi (Showtime). Her theater credits include works at Court Theater, The Goodman Theater, Steppenwolf, Free Street Theater, UrbantTheater Company, Victory Gardens, The Greenhouse Theater, Oracle Theater, and Teatro Luna. She is currently an Ensemble Member at UrbanTheater Company and Africaribe.
